Bishop Lee's robes and the story they tell



The robes were created by Juliet Hemingray and are full of colour and symbols significant for Bishop Lee and the God we meet in the person of Jesus. It is "A Cope of many colours" reminiscent of Joseph and the God who enables dreams to be turned into reality.

The colours through the robes link together the liturgical colours for Advent & Lent (purple/blue), Christmas & Easter (gold/white), Pentecost (red) and Other (green).

The Cope (Bishop's Cloak)

- → on the hood (the back) is the triquetra, the symbol of the Holy Trinity, with bright lines of fire (the Holy Spirit) and sun (the Light of Christ)
- → on the front right (as worn) the fire of the Holy Spirit appears above grapes, symbolising Jesus' words at the Last Supper, and speaking to his followers about abiding and bearing fruit in Jesus as grapes develop and flourish by being part of a much bigger Vine

→ on the front left (as worn) the light of Christ appears above nails, symbolising the pain and suffering which Christ suffered to demonstrate God's nature of love in the most shocking way, conquering the power of death

The Mitre (Bishop's hat)

- → on the front is the triquetra again
- → on the back an atom connects the worlds of science and faith which are integral to Bishop Lee's life
- → the empty crosses on the tails symbolise the resurrection

Arriving in Swindon three elements signalled powerfully that God had put Bishop Lee in the right place at the right time: North Swindon's Orbital Centre with its image of the atom; 'The Power of Dreams' as the tagline for Honda; and that Bristol's Cathedral Church is dedicated to 'The Holy & Undivided Trinity'. This has felt true for the past 18 years.

Pattern Church talk 30 April 2023 – Bishop Lee

Let me begin with a quick show of hands: how many of you have heard people talking about FOMO - F - O - M - O? Now keep your hands up if you know what Fomo stands for? (Not many, most of you, maybe only the under 40s)

FOMO stands for Fear of Missing Out, and I guess most of us have experienced this at some point in our lives, even if it is not something we live with every day. Today I want to thank you for turning up, and for those who turned up at the Farewell Service for Liz and I which was held at the Cathedral on Maundy Thursday. We are truly grateful to have you here with us, and especially grateful for those who have worked so hard to make this, and the Cathedral Farewell service, so special.

I sincerely hope that FOMO has not been an issue for anyone. It should not have been because just about anybody who wanted to come today was welcome. The invitation was an open one, all that to happen was the spreading of the word around the diocese. Now if you want to go to the Coronation of King Charles, and you have not yet received an invitation, prepare to be disappointed. However, it is on television, just as today's Service is being streamed.

Earlier today, some of you may have heard an interview I was invited to have on Radio Wiltshire. In the interview I mentioned that a letter inviting me to meet with the then Bishop of Bristol, Mike Hill (who I am delighted is here with us today) had accidentally been put in the pile of junk mail as Liz and I returned from summer holiday. Another day I may have simply dumped it with the other junk mail into the recycling bin. Mike would have assumed I was not interested in following up, and I would not have been any the wiser! What the eye doesn't see, the heart doesn't grieve over!

I am very aware that many who are here are as familiar and comfortable with Services in church as I am in knowing the ropes of going into a betting shop and putting £20 each way on a horse. I may know some of the language, but it is pretty alien otherwise!

Just about everybody here probably expected a reading from the Bible, and we had a very short one. But perhaps what we heard Jesus saying in that reading was more than a little puzzling. The Kingdom of God is like someone who found treasure in someone's field and hid it; then in their joy they went and sold all they had and bought the field. I'm not sure what you think about this, but if it was your field and your treasure you might have something to say. Jesus then went on to paint another picture of this Kingdom: It's like a merchant looking out for pearls he can sell to others at a profit. But he finds one which is so beautiful, and so expensive, that he sells all his other pearls in order to get this one. Well at least that's a little more honest!

Jesus was a master of painting pictures and telling stories. These parables, as we call them, were not only easy to remember, but they were like those songs which we call earworms. They hung around in people's consciousness, asking them to look closer, to think from different angles, and to gradually or suddenly see what Jesus was getting at, and more significantly what he was about, and who he really was.

I wonder what **you** would say about Jesus? Take a moment to think about what you would say if you are approached by a person on the street interested in your view. As a bishop in the Church of England, there is a lot I can say about Jesus. However, when I am asked about what Christian Good news is about I borrow from some words said about 30 years ago by Canon Robert Warren. He said this "God's way of being human has been revealed in Jesus Christ, is available through the work of the Holy Spirit of God, and is currently being demonstrated in a church near you!

In and through Jesus we are shown God's way of being human, and given the spiritual resources and strength to live that out. This is not a solo effort but with, for and alongside, people who may be very different from ourselves. Indeed difference and variety is fundamental and foundational to the way of life that God in Jesus Christ invites us into, the True and Living Way for being a human being.

Jesus used lots of words, including his parables and stories. But in the end it was what people saw in the lives of those who follow Christ which made the difference and that is true today. Every Christian is on a journey in this respect and it is lifelong with continual learning. Most of you here today have received an invitation and the fact that you are here shows you responded. Some didn't have an invitation, but knew there was an open door. On that invitation which you may not have seen there were four letters which we have adopted from a different language. Those letters are R S V P Respondez S'il Vous Plait. In English, "Please respond and let us know if you are coming."

I guess the last thing I want to say as Bishop of Swindon, is that there is a much bigger invitation than I could have ever sent out and you have responded to, and unlike my invitation, this invitation is not something answered without needing a great deal of thought and consideration. This invitation trumps and outranks even an invitation from King Charles III. It is from Jesus himself and the God he taught us to call Father. If you have not already started on this path, my last wish as Bishop of Swindon is to look more closely and deeply at Christ's invitation and explore it with others who are wondering whether this Good News which has changed the world, can change and bless your world as much as it has mine.
