

Dear Friends,

February brings heart shapes everywhere – cards, sweets, ornaments, cushions, I've even seen heart shaped crumpets. St. Valentine has become the patron saint of love and around his festival on the 14th we are inundated with symbols of love everywhere. Of course, once the 15th arrives all those symbols will have been eaten, recycled, discarded, or perhaps put away as keepsakes – and the remainder in the shops will be sold off at a discount.

Romantic love is a wonderful thing while it lasts, and can be the foundation for lasting, mutual care and relationships, but like the cards and gifts, chocolate and crumpets, it is often soon gone or sold cheap. But love is very important: - love of family, friends, neighbours, all humankind, as individuals, as groups, love for creation, for all life on our planet, for ourselves. Without love, which gives us a focus, a passion, a reason to act positively for others we would miss so much that is good in our lives. Real love is not cheap, easy, or disposable, it's not always shiny or fluffy or tasty; it can be difficult, unrewarding, costly, and unrelenting but as the song goes what use is a world without love?

The Bible has much to say about love – asking us to love one another, to love God and to love ourselves. It tells us to love because God loved us first and God's love is unconditional – that love doesn't care who we are, what we look like, what we have done, whether we are rich or poor or have a GSOH (good sense of humour). God's love is never-ending and we can never do anything to earn it, or do anything that will stop it.



For those of us who follow a faith, we are asked to share that love, to pass it on and follow God's example. That's not always easy, and we often fail because we are human, not divine.

If you find it hard to love, or feel you fail at times, the passage below offers some guidance, and a reminder of just how much we are loved by the one who will never stop loving us.

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. 1 Corinthians 13:4-7

May you know just how much you are loved and may you share that love with everyone you meet not just this Valentine's Day but always.

Down Country Lane and Tracks

In Search of St Cuthbert's Shrine Durham Cathedral.

In the last issue I wrote about Lindisfarne and St Cuthbert this month continues the story to when St Cuthbert died in 687 AD. St Cuthbert was buried originally on Lindisfarne but due to raids by Danes and Scots the monks on Lindisfarne packed up and left the island for safety in 883AD. They took with them the coffin of St Cuthbert and travelled to Chester Le Street where they settled. Further raids moved them onto Ripon for safety; later they travelled onto Durham where there was a castle fortification and this is where they finally settled in 995 AD.

It was decided to build a Cathedral and Benedictine Monastery to house a shrine to St Cuthbert on a high point over the river Wear with fortification. 93 years later in 1093AD Bishop William of St Calais ordered the building of a new Norman Cathedral on the same design and size as Old St Peters Basilica in Rome. The work was completed by Bishop Ranulf Flambard in 1193 AD using the same stone masons as Winchester



Cathedral.

St Cuthbert's Shrine was built at the east end of the Quire of the Cathedral and gradually it was filled with ornate furnishing and was one of the most visited shrines in the country. This was plundered by King Henry VIII commissioners in 1539. Eye witnesses said they brought with them a goldsmith to take away all the gold, silver and precious stones who opened the coffin of St Cuthbert to see if there were more jewels, only to find the Body of St Cuthbert still in its original state of preservation and the commissioners fled.

The Cathedral held many rare treasures including the Lindisfarne Gospels which have been moved to the British Museum. St Cuthbert's shrine today at the east end of the Cathedral is a quiet space with seats allowing you to just sit and pray. It is a wonderful experience to just sit quietly reflect and meditate. It is easy to think of St Cuthbert in his life of simple prayerful worship and leadership of the Lindisfarne monastery.

The Celtic Tradition is centred in the northeast and at Durham Cathedral are the resting places of St Cuthbert and the Venerable Bede who were two of its Spiritual leaders.

One lasting picture of St Cuthbert was a full size Bronze sculpture which was in Lindisfarne Church of 6 Monks carrying St Cuthbert's coffin away from Lindisfarne. In 2000 for the millennium a further copy of this full size Sculpture has been erected in the central Square in Durham, a sight to be seen.

Our last meeting was Christmas party evening, with party games, including pass-the-parcel, chocolate game, and doughnut eating race and plenty of party food.


On 14th January, Junior Boys joined other Junior and Company Boys at Stroud Bowling Alley for the Gloucestershire 10 pin bowling competition.
