#### A year in the life of a curate

Dear friends

I can't believe a whole year has passed since I joined you at Stratton Team Ministry as your Curate!

The welcome you all gave me and Anthony last July was heartwarming and I am so enjoying getting to know you. It's moving to see and hear how you live out your faith, and the love and care you share within each congregation and beyond.



Every week is different and brings its own joys and challenges. Alongside leading and preaching at Sunday services, and other special services (e.g. Advent), every month, I travel to Bristol for ongoing training with other curates. I take funerals, and also have the joy of baptising children.

I visit the housebound and those in hospital, sometimes sharing communion with them if appropriate. It is a privilege to come alongside people at such times, and moving to share communion with someone on a busy ward. I sense then that the Holy Spirit brings God's presence into that place, blessing not only those of us taking part but in a mysterious way also the other patients, visitors and staff.

I visit South Marston School each term to lead an assembly, often alongside Elveen, and have attended special school services in the church. As a newly-appointed Foundation Governor, I attend meetings of the governing board. Learning the special jargon used in education can be challenging! However I am also inspired by the insight we receive as governors into the life of the school, and by the dedication of the staff to supporting the children to the best of their ability, in all aspects of their lives in what is a relatively small school.

Along with Elveen, I attend monthly meetings of the Deanery Chapter (the other ordained ministers working in Swindon Deanery) and this gives me glimpses of ministry in different benefices and parishes, and of the richness of different approaches and traditions.

Elveen is my "Training Incumbent", and I really appreciate our weekly supervision meetings – these allow me to reflect with her on the situations I meet and to learn from her experience and wisdom.

The ordination services outline the roles of Deacon and Priest: "Deacons are ordained so that the people of God may be better equipped to make Christ known... as he washed the feet of his disciples, so they must wash the feet of others"; "Priests are ordained to lead Christ's people in the offering of praise and the proclamation of the gospel.... they are to set the example of the Good Shepherd always before them."

So what will change when I am priested on 5<sup>th</sup> July? Priests are *still* Deacons, but are able to perform other duties including celebrating Holy Communion. I look forward to doing so for the first time at the Team Service at St Margaret's on 6<sup>th</sup> July.

I am so grateful to all of you for your support on my ordination day – whether you will be there in the Cathedral, or whether you can't be there in person but are also supporting me in prayer.

I've been asked by some of you, how much longer I will be with you in Stratton Team. All being well, in two years' time my curacy will be "signed off" and I will look for a post as incumbent.

As I approach my ordination as priest, I am grateful as ever for all your support, encouragement and prayers. None of us can do what God calls us to do in our own strength, only by God's grace and guidance.

I am so grateful to God for bringing me to come and work here, and look forward to continuing to work among you and learn from you over the coming months.

#### SYMBOLS

Since Ancient times flags, banners and standards have had their place in history. Today is no different, but how many "Wiltshire Moonrakers" know of their own County Flag?

It has a background of alternate horizontal green and white stripes signifying the Wiltshire Downs overlaying the deep chalk layers laid down eons ago.

In the centre, two concentric circles pay homage to the Neolithic stone circles of Avebury and Stonehenge. Six alternate green and white segments appear between the two rings which allude to the six counties that border our home county.

This flag has a green background and in the centre is a depiction of our county bird, a Bustard. This is the world's heaviest flying bird that can be seen in the skies of Salisbury Plain.

Countless other flags and standards abound all around the world but surely, as Christians, we revere the simple humble Cross, so full of meaning and hope!

So the little bit of love from the Samaritan outshone the pity from the earlier passers by! Jesus' message to love your neighbour is illustrated admirably in this parable!
