Dear friends

Families are important, aren't they – sometimes challenging, people fall out, don't do what you expect – and also sources of wonderful support and joyful connection.

Being a literal kind of person, I used to have a somewhat literal view of what family was. But over the years family has come to mean not only my blood relatives, but others who join along the way, as partners of family members. One of my much-loved aunts, Joanie, came from a small family herself, but always treated the members of the family she married into with the same love and generosity as if we'd been blood relatives. She really was an important member of our family.

People sometimes say, you don't choose your family, but you do choose your friends. In fact many friendships just happen, as we get to know neighbours and people we work with. Some we will naturally have more in common with than others and those friendships outlive the original point of connection.

And when we belong to a church, we get to know those who belong there too. While we may share more interests with some than others, what we all have in common is our desire to worship God, to explore and grow in our faith, and to serve each other and our community.

Many of Jesus' sayings are challenging. One that has troubled me is what he says, when he is speaking to a crowd in a house, and is told that his mother, brothers and sisters were outside and want him.



“Who is my mother?” he replies – and then, looking at those sitting around him, “Look! Here are my mother and my brothers! Whoever does what God wants is my brother, my sister, my mother.”

Sounds harsh, doesn't it? But if we consider that Jesus is not devaluing his own earthly family, but actually raising up those who are not his blood relatives, but who listen to him and do God's will.

And if that includes us, then Jesus is our brother! Believing in Jesus, as we read in John 1, gives us the right to become God's children. We are part of the worldwide family of God.

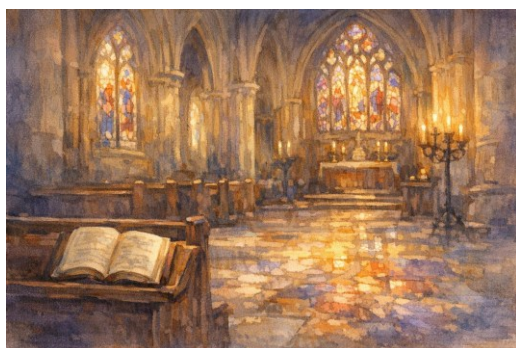
As Elveen wrote in last month's magazine, church is our Christian home on earth, and we share together in contributing to the running of that home, in all the ways we support each other and work together.

And as we are seen to love one another as Jesus has loved us – so others will know we are his disciples.

This prayer is by the 13th century St Richard of Chichester:

Thanks be to thee, my Lord Jesus Christ,

O most merciful redeemer, friend and brother,
may I know thee more clearly,
love thee more dearly,
and follow thee more nearly, day by day.

Not long after, we discovered Max wasn't a tom but decided to keep the name she'd got used to. They gave us endless fun with their antics.

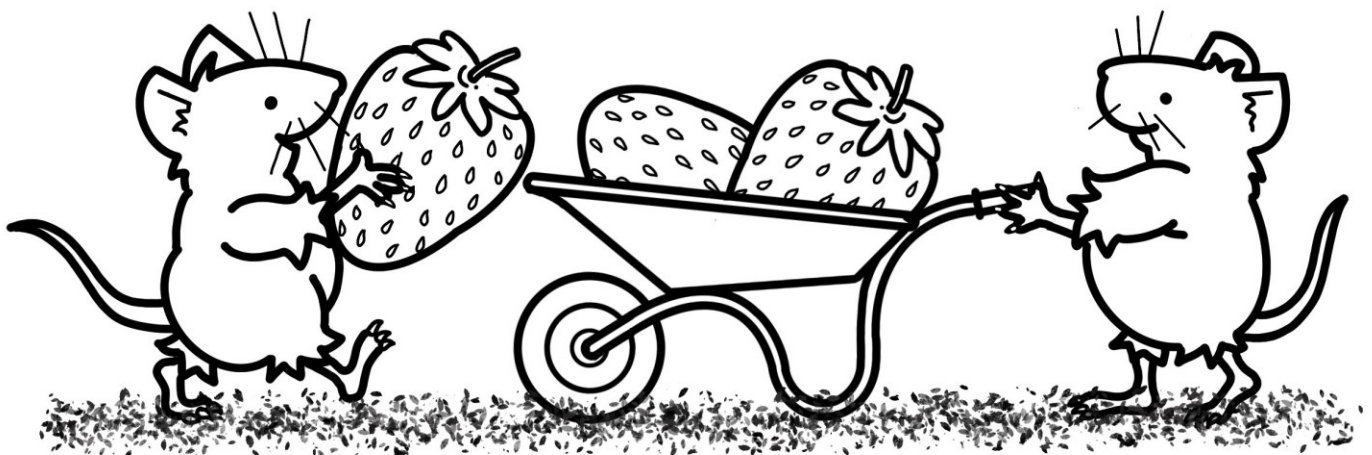

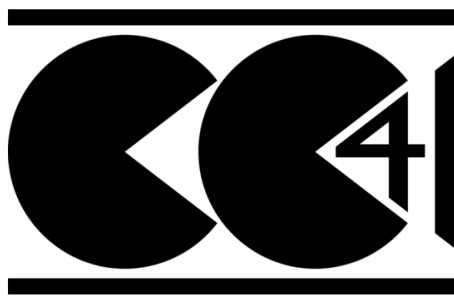


Now, the bark of the lilac tree, shredded by the sharpening of little claws, is the only reminder of our two much-loved feline friends.

CC41 I wonder how many people today realise the significance of this logo?

During the last war with rationing and shortages the waste of any resource was a further strain on energy and materials.

The Government introduced the “UTILITY” legislation in order to conserve scarce materials and fuel. Dresses no longer had pleats, men's trousers no longer had turnups, lapels became narrow, zips disappeared to be used in military equipment and the number of buttons per garment were specified.

Utility was the order of the day. Furniture was to basic standards for those with the required permits, such as newly weds and those who had lost everything in bombing raids. Stories abounded of dressing tables with ex orange boxes forming their backs still with printing on them.

Utility buses with 32 slatted wooden seats and just a steel sheet forming the sides were to be seen. The “Old Firm” buses run by Hawkin’s from Wroughton appeared. Two, DHF1479 and DHR480 were part of their fleet which ran between Temple Street and Wroughton “WHITE HART”.

Sheets, Pillowcases and Blankets also carried the CC41 logo.

Facts and Figures disappear into the past and nothing stays the same, war is terrible and yet new things come about, Radar and Antibiotics are examples and yet one thing never changes and that is the presence of our Lord God and on Him we can put our trust He does not carry a CC41 logo for He is perfection and never fails our faith and trust in Him.

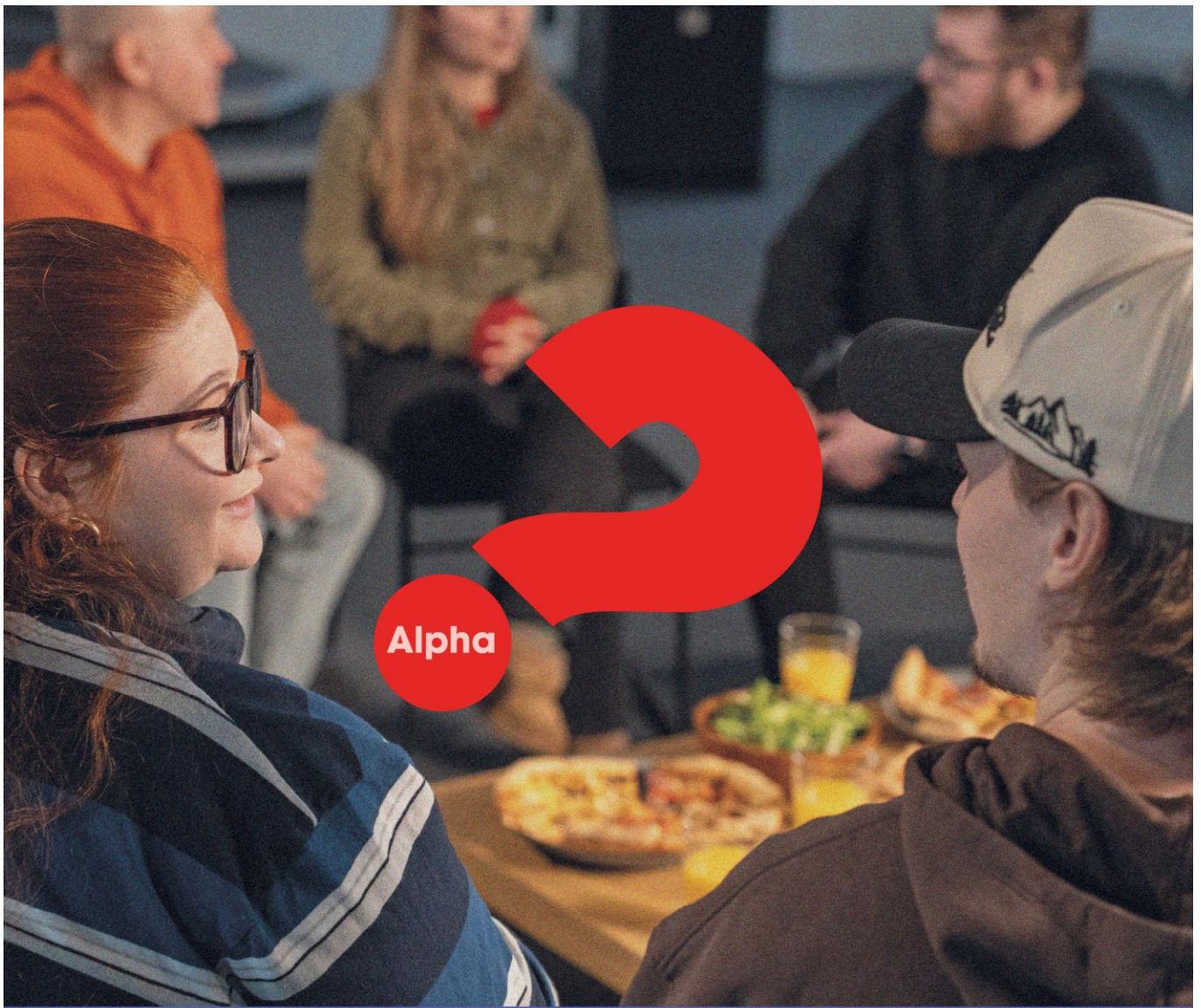

CALVARY MEDITATION GARDEN

There is a green hill far away
outside a city wall
Where the dear Lord was crucified
who died to save us all

Hymn written by Cecil Frances Alexander (1818-1895)



During recent building work, the land had to be cleared to make way for machinery. Unfortunately, this left us with an area compacted and difficult to manage. There is a mound situated in the middle, without some form of ground penetrating radar, it is impossible to know what sits below. It was felt this would make an ideal Calvary Meditation Garden, somewhere visitors to the church could sit, meditate and reflect.

The Calvary Garden Includes:

- A mound which represents Calvary/Golgotha, the site of the crucifixion – [Matthew 27:33](#) – “They came to a place called Golgotha (which means the place of the Skull)”
- On the left-hand side sits a clump of nettles – depicting those who called for Jesus to be crucified – [Luke 23:21](#) – “But they kept shouting crucify him, crucify him”
- A row of stones - the Jerusalem City Wall - [Luke 19:44](#) - “They will dash you to the ground they will not leave one stone on another because you did not recognise the time of God’s coming to you”
- On top of the wall sits two angels – Archangel Uriel – according to Ethiopian Homily Uriel dipped his wing in Christ’s blood, placed it in a chalice and sprinkled it around the area. Where the blood fell a church was built. It is suggested that Archangel Michael stood guard at the cross to prevent demonic interference.
- Also sitting on the wall are Viola flowers - representing the purple robe – [Mark 15:20](#) – “And when they had mocked him, they took off the purple robe and put his own clothes on him. They led him out to crucify him”.
- A group of thistles sit on top of the mound – the crown of thorns – [John 19:2](#) – “And the soldiers twisted together a crown of thorns and put it on his head”
- The Cross – [Luke 23:26](#) – “And when they led him away, they seized Simon of Cyrene.... and placed on him the cross to carry behind Jesus”
- A border of Dicentra - represents those who witnessed the crucifixion - [Matthew 27:56](#) – “Among them were Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, Joseph of Arimathea and the other Mary”
- Sitting to the right of the Calvary Garden is the Tomb Garden – [John 20:17](#) – “.... Jesus said ‘Do not hold on to me for I have not yet returned to the Father. Go instead to my brothers and tell them’”
[Mark 16:19](#) – “After the Lord Jesus had spoken to them, he was taken up into Heaven and he sat at the right hand of God”
